REPORT OF THE SUMMER SESSION

To the President:

Sir:—The Summer Session of 1928 proceeded along the same lines as those of previous summers. The attendance was 631 of whom 320 were men and 311 women. These numbers show a gratifying growth in interest in the Summer Session and are all the more satisfying because of the increasing percentage of students who are not in the regular college session.

A large number of conferences were held in connection with the Session, and these were unusually well attended. The Ministers Conference or Short Course came to a close in this its fourth year. The attendance for this work continually dwindled until during this year there were only six left.

The plan of inviting to the campus professors in other colleges to give work was inaugurated in 1927 in a small way, and was continued during the Session of 1928. This plan has proved very satisfactory and should be continued and further extended.

The success of the Summer Session is no longer in doubt. It remains now to place its many advantages before those who can profit from them.
