REPORT OF THE SUMMER SESSION

To the President:

Sir:—The sixteenth annual Summer Session, which opened June 24 and closed August 1, was marked by the largest increase in enrollment since 1919. Seven hundred thirty-nine students, an increase of 94 over the preceding year, enrolled during the session.

Of these, 339 were regular students of the Institution, 231 were summer students only and 169 were graduate students. The largest increase (61) was in the Graduate School where a special four-weeks course for Smith-Hughes teachers was established. The accompanying table of attendance shows the distribution of students among the various classifications:

Thirty-one departments with a staff of 92 offered courses during the Session. Of the 174 courses given, 38 were for graduate students and 136 for under-graduates. In spite of an increase of 13 graduate courses over 1929 and a larger percentage of professors teaching, the average cost per student was lowered from \$36.65 to \$35.57. The increased enrollment made this reduction possible.

Summer conferences and short courses held during the summer also showed substantial increases in enrollment. This was particularly noticeable in the Short Course for Town and Country Ministers where the enrollment increased from nine in 1929 to 25 in 1930. This course, the first of a three-year series, was given from July 7 to 18. Classes were formed in the following subjects: Rural Church Conditions and
